FROM THE PASTOR: *Standing in the Gates of the Lord*

I was glad when they said to me, 'Let us go to the house of the Lord!'" ~ Psalm 122:1

Grace is blessed with a large Narthex where folks can gather and talk Royals baseball or the various ailments our children get at school. Trinity's - though marked by the beautiful stained glass of the Baptism of Christ - is quite a bit smaller, which sometimes limits our conversations. The separation between the Narthex and the Sanctuary in both congregations is marked by doors. Once that threshold is crossed, a different world is entered: in the Sanctuary we *stand in the gates of the Lord*.

But how is one to stand in these gates? What separates the Narthex from the Sanctuary? How are we to act inside; and what about outside? What is left at the doors, and what comes with us as we go into the house of the Lord?

Perhaps it's because of the larger Narthex, but at Grace there's quite a bit less small talk within the doors of the Sanctuary. At Trinity, for a time, we had signs at the door asking for reverent silence upon entering. Why?

Well, it's certainly not because we want to stifle joyous conversation, or the friendship of the saints who gather! There's nothing *stuffy* about it - it's just that the place inside the doors is different than outside. Not magically so, by the way, but different in what is given and received. The Sanctuary is only called the *sanctuary* - the holy place - because that is where Christ Jesus comes to us with His flesh and blood for the forgiveness of sin. Outside the doors He is certainly present - just as He is *omni-present*, that is, present everywhere as God. However, the presence of God can be located in a uniquely wonderful way within the gates of the Sanctuary. This presence is marked by an altar, and is held in a chalice. Here, God is uniquely present *for you*.

Because of this *for-you-presence* we recognize with thankfulness that this space is now different. It becomes the meeting place of heaven and earth. And with that, our demeanor changes. This place should be comfortable, but differently so than a coffee-shop, or your living room. It should be comfortable because here God is *for you*: to comfort your burdened conscience, to heal your fatal disease, to give you hope and a future and the certainty of what's to

come! But not comfortable in the way that you might kick your feet up and sip a soda. Our comfort in this place comes from faith - faith that confesses who God is *for me* here and now.

This place, though comfortable, is not common. It is not everywhere. It's not outside the Sanctuary doors. Outside the sanctuary doors is the common place: the place for ribbing each other in joy; for sports and politics; for twirling kids and sipping coffee. Outside the gates isn't bad - not by a long shot - but it's different than inside. And with that, so is our behavior, and our dress, our conversation, and our focus.

Within the gates of the Lord our minds are set at attention of the Lord and His work for us and for all. Sure, some of this attention is spent trying to help our kids sit (relatively!) still, and to fold their hands while praying, and not rip the hymnal out of their siblings' hands! Sometimes our attention gets called away by a dropped bulletin, or by a rabbit looking in the window at Grace. But, for the most part, our ears and eyes (sometimes even our noses!) are fixed on Christ and His Word, His promise, His love for us.

So that we can devote our hearts and minds to Christ and His salvific work for us, let us try to remove unnecessary distractions. Certainly, this doesn't mean to remove children from the gates of the Lord! They learn to focus their thoughts and minds on Christ by the discipline and example of their parents and the saints who sit with them. But it means we should limit our side conversations, quiet our voices, and keep our cell-phones silenced and safely stowed for after the service.

It also means that when we enter the gates of the Lord, we ought to allow for the faithful meditation of His Word, and the prayers of His saints. Especially at the beginning of the service, it would be wonderful for there to be an opportunity to turn our hearts and minds from the common things of this world - the cares and plans and activities - to our Lord. You might turn to the front of your hymnal for prayers, and read the Scriptures for the day. Sometimes this takes more than a minute or two.

Let us be respectful of one another, and together fix our eyes on Jesus, the Author and Perfector of our faith. And as we go, let the common joys be shared!

From our Confessions

[Taken from The Smalcald Articles, found in the Book of Concord.]

Part III, Article III.

Of the False Repentance of the Papists.

Continued from last month...

20] Here, too, there was no faith nor Christ, and the virtue of the absolution was not declared to him, but upon his enumeration of sins and his self-abasement depended his consolation. What torture, rascality, and idolatry such confession has produced is more than can be related.

21] As to satisfaction, this is by far the most involved [perplexing] part of all. For no man could know how much to render for a single sin, not to say how much for all. Here they have resorted to the device of imposing a small satisfaction, which could indeed be rendered, as five Paternosters, a day's fast, etc.; for the rest [that was lacking] of the [in their] repentance they were directed to purgatory.

22] Here, too, there was nothing but anguish and [extreme] misery. [For] some thought that they would never get out of purgatory, because, according to the old canons, seven years' repentance is required for a single mortal sin. 23] Nevertheless, confidence was placed upon our work of satisfaction, and if the satisfaction could have been perfect, confidence would have been placed in it entirely, and neither faith nor Christ would have been of use. But this confidence was impossible. For, although any one had done penance in that way for a hundred years, he would still not have known whether he had finished his penance. That meant forever to do penance and never to come to repentance.

24] Here now the Holy See at Rome, coming to the aid of the poor Church, invented indulgences, whereby it forgave and remitted [expiation or] satisfaction, first, for a single instance, for seven years, for a hundred years and distributed them among the cardinals and bishops, so that one could grant indulgence for a hundred years and another for a hundred days. But he reserved to himself alone the power to remit the entire satisfaction.

25] Now, since this began to yield money, and the traffic in bulls became profitable he devised the golden jubilee year [a truly gold-bearing year], and fixed it at Rome. He called this the remission of all punishment and guilt. Then the people came running, because every one would fain have been freed from this grievous, unbearable burden. This meant to find [dig up] and raise the treasures of the earth. Immediately the Pope pressed still further, and multiplied the golden years one upon another. But the more he devoured money, the wider grew his maw. Later, therefore, he issued them [those golden years of his] by his legates [everywhere] to the countries, until all churches and houses were full of the Golden Year. 26] At last he also made an inroad into purgatory among the dead, first, by founding masses and vigils, afterwards, by indulgences and the Golden Year, and finally souls became so cheap that he released one for a farthing.

27] But all this, too, was of no avail. For although the Pope taught men to depend upon, and trust in, these indulgences [for salvation], yet he rendered the [whole] matter again uncertain. For in his bulls he declares: Whoever would share in the indulgences or a Golden Year must be contrite, and have confessed, and pay money. Now, we have heard above that this contrition and confession are with them uncertain and hypocrisy. Likewise, also no one knew what soul was in purgatory, and if some were therein, no one knew which had properly repented and confessed. Thus he took the precious money [the Pope snatched up the holy pence], and comforted them meanwhile with [led them to confidence in] his power and indulgence, and [then again led them away from that and] directed them again to their uncertain work.

28] If, now [although], there were some who did not believe [acknowledge] themselves guilty of such actual sins in [committed by] thoughts, words, and works,—as I, and such as I, in monasteries and chapters [fraternities or colleges of priests], wished to be monks and priests, and by fasting, watching, praying, saying Mass, coarse garments, and hard beds, etc., fought against [strove to resist] evil thoughts, and in full earnest and with force wanted to be holy, and yet the hereditary, inborn evil sometimes did in sleep what it is wont to do (as also St. Augustine and Jerome among others confess),—still each one held the other in esteem, so that some, according to our teaching, were regarded as holy, without sin and full of good works, so much so that with this mind we would communicate and sell our good works to others, as being superfluous to us for heaven. This is indeed true, and seals, letters, and instances [that this happened] are at hand.

29] [When there were such, I say.] These did not need repentance. For of what would they repent, since they had not indulged wicked thoughts? What would they confess [concerning words not uttered], since they had avoided words? For what should they render satisfaction, since they were so guiltless of any deed that they could even sell their superfluous righteousness to other poor sinners? Such saints were also the Pharisees and scribes in the time of Christ.

This jubilant triumph-song of the saints of God was written by Hans A. Brorson in the later years of his life. It is No. 559 in Landstad's *Salmebog* and No 492 in *The Lutheran Hymnary*, 1913. The translation is a composite one, prepared for *The Lutheran Hymnary* by O.T. Sanden (Arnesson), O.H. Smeby, Carl Doving, and Mr. Kvamme.

The following tribute to this hymn by the hymnologist Soderberg is worthy of note:

Of the glory of the life to come the harp of Brorson has wonderful strains. This hymn about the Lord's elect in heaven radiates a snow-white splendor of the transfiguration...

What is it that touches us so wondrously in this and other swan-songs by Brorson? It is the folk-tune, the spirit of the language and the rhythm, of the imagery and thought, something incomparable and unexplainable, an element of power everlasting: That is, this plain, pious, emotional lyric passion which gives birth to sadness and longing, power and triumphant joy. Therefore so many of Brorson's swan-songs in particular have received their tunes - mellow and sonorous at the same time - from the inmost life of the common people living in the valleys and forests, along the hillsides and among the mountains, of Norway; and perhaps no more beautiful melody than that of "Den store, hvide flok" has welled forth from religious craving of the heart of the Norwegian people for an expression in song - spontaneously and sweetly, as a multitudinous reverberation, a hallelujah to the poet's inspired words in his beautiful anthem.

The tune "Great White Host" is a Norwegian folk-tune of the early seventeenth century, arranged by Edvard H. Grieg. It has helped to make this the most widely known Scandinavian hymn in English-speaking countries. The singing of this hymn by Christiansen's choir of St. Olaf's College has popularized it with the American public.

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I Trust When Dark My Road: A Lutheran View of Depression

Todd A. Peperkorn

(St. Louis: Lutheran World Relief and Human Care, 2009, 102 pages)

This little booklet has already served its purpose countless times over—it has literally saved lives. It gives voice to the voiceless and sympathy to the one who thinks he's all alone. It's a book about depression, but not abstractly—it's about one Pastor's battle with depression. Pastor Peperkorn, who lives to tell his struggle, reveals the inner depths and the bottomless pit of depression. Thank God for Pastor Peperkorn and the Lord's deliverance of him and others who suffer with him.

The book's Forward is by Synod President Matthew Harrison, in which he relates the battle of depression to earlier pastors in our Synod—notably the lament of the 2nd President, Friedrich Wyneken. Harrison reveals one of the major misconceptions about depression when he says: "Many go untreated, ashamed, and believing that a 'strong faith' would preclude such difficulties, and so the path to wellness is through a restoration of such faith. Not so" (p.2).

After the Forward is the Introduction by Dr. Beverly Yahnke, a licensed clinical psychologist, who serves as the executive director for Christian counseling for *Doxology* and as a department chair and professor at Concordia University Wisconsin (CUW). Yahnke laments: "*Sadly, clinical depression is often misunderstood as a character flaw, a deficit of will or an absence of sufficient faith.*


Some glance aside, wagging their heads sadly believing that depressed people simply don't choose to 'snap out of it' or that they just don't choose to 'suck it up' and get on with what it is they've been given to do" (p.5).

Depression is the plague that no one has felt free to speak of—most especially in the ministry—until fairly recently. Pastor Peperkorn's book is evidence of where we've come; and so is *Doxology* (The Lutheran Center for Spiritual Care and Counsel). Thank God the voices are speaking up and out about this debilitating disease. Thank God pastors are getting help and the support they need. I think Pastor Peperkorn puts it most pointedly when he says that "*depression must surely be a first cousin to hell on earth*" (6). This is what many Christians go through all too often, pastors included.

There are 10 chapters in the book, each between 5 and 15 pages. And through these pages Pastor Peperkorn tells his story. This isn't a clinical or theoretical discussion of depression. It's an account of how he planned to kill himself and how he was saved. He reflects on the pain of depression within the family, the Church, and what went on in his own mind. He honestly speaks of his anger and anxiety, how he would close himself off and not want to see anyone, even his own wife. He talks of the *disability* he suffered from this depression and how there was no hope for him—he thought. Chapter nine is the grim tale of *Thinking the Un-thinkable*: can a Christian commit suicide? Thank God Pastor Peperkorn was given the rest and hope he needed. Thank God there was a treatment: medical and spiritual. He was prescribed a heavy dosage of the Gospel along with the necessary pills to fix what wasn't a spiritual disease. In the epilogue he admits there is no end, or magic bullet to finish off the depression. It's a cross he and many others bear. And letting his reflection end on the cross is right where it needs to be.

Each chapter ends in prayer and questions to ponder. The goal of this book is to be self-reflective—to consider your story in light of his. In the end, there's a list of recommendations for what to do if a loved one suffers from depression: prayer, communication with them and their spouse, giving space, but not avoidance, and never to give up. Finally, there's a list of recommended reading that is surely helpful to all.

I highly recommend this book, even if you don't think depression is something that particularly plagues you. The book is free and can be downloaded as a PDF online. Pastor Peperkorn also keeps a blog on the topic of depression. You can visit: <http://www.darkmyroad.org/>. He also has on that site links to interviews he has done, most notably the one on suicide in the wake of Robin Williams a month or two ago.





Stewardship Newsletter Article - November 2014

Have you ever noticed how children emulate their parents? Children watch their parents and they do what they see them doing. This is how they learn to speak. They watch the shape and form of their parents' mouths and they try to make the same shape so that they can make the same sounds.

But children copy their parents even on a more mundane level. They watch how their parents cross their legs, how they fold their hands, how they stand and sit and walk, how they do and say most everything; and children try to copy it. This can be quite humorous when caught in the act. They do this even when parents don't want them to. Everyone has been in the uncomfortable, and sometimes rather embarrassing, situation where a child does or says what one of their parent's have done or said...something that is not too flattering! Sitcoms thrive on this sort of thing. And it only works because of the truth that children emulate their parents. And they do it because they want to be like them.


We are the children of God by grace, through faith. In Holy Baptism, God the Father declares of us what He declared of Jesus at His Baptism in the Jordan, "You are my beloved Son, in whom I am well pleased." God the Father claims us as His own. He takes away all our sins, and in exchange He gives us His righteousness, His purity, His holiness, and His Spirit, by which we cry out, "Abba, Father." We are born again, born from above, born of water and the Spirit, to a new life in Christ as His children. We are sons of God in Christ, through Baptism. And since we are sons, we are heirs; heirs who share in the glory of the Son of God. The inheritance is ours because of the Father's grace and mercy, because of His generosity in sending His Son in time to save us for all eternity.

And this is why we give generously of our income to the work of the church. Through the working of the Holy Spirit, we are enabled to lead holy lives. We are strengthened to emulate the generosity of our heavenly Father by being generous ourselves. We give to the work of the church because we have witnessed the generous giving of our Father in heaven. More than that, we are recipients of it. It is because we have received God our Father's gifts that we desire to give ourselves. And His gifts are not just spiritual. They are temporal and earthly as well. As the Small Catechism teaches in the Fourth Petition of the Lord's Prayer:

"Give us this day our daily bread. *What does this mean?* God certainly gives daily bread to everyone without our prayers, even to all evil people, but we pray in this petition that God would lead us to realize this and to receive our daily bread with thanksgiving. *What is meant by daily bread?* Daily bread includes everything that has to do with the support and needs of the body, such as food, drink, clothing, shoes, house, home, land, animals, money, goods, a devout husband or wife, devout children, devout workers, devout and faithful rulers, good government, good weather, peace, health, self-control, good reputation, good friends, faithful neighbors, and the like."

In other words, he gives us everything that we need for the care of both body and soul. His generosity knows no bounds.

Therefore we sit down at the beginning of the year, the beginning of the month, or the beginning of the week, and set aside a generous portion of God's daily bread for His work in the church. Not because He has commanded us so to do. But rather because we, as His children by grace, want to emulate His generosity in our own lives. He is our Father; we are His children. And children want to be like their parents.

November 2 – All Saints Day (observed)

God declares us all to be saints through the cleansing blood of Jesus. Thus, no matter what difficulty, pain, or suffering brings tears to our eyes, we turn not to the sinful solutions offered by the world, but to the promises of God who “will wipe away every tear from their eyes” (Revelation 7:17b).

Prayer: Jesus, help us focus, not so much upon what is happening to us as Your saints but upon what You have in store for Your saints. Amen.

November 9 – Twenty-second Sunday after Pentecost

For many the “day of the Lord,” the day the Lord returns, will be “darkness, and not light, and gloom with no brightness in it” (Amos 5:20). But for those who have been called out of the darkness of sin and death through Jesus Christ, it will be eternal light and “we will always be with the Lord” (1 Thessalonians 4:17b). When times are difficult and trying for our fellow Christian, we follow Paul’s advice, “Therefore encourage one another with these words” (4:18).

Prayer: Lord, help us encourage one another. Amen.

November 16 – Twenty-third Sunday after Pentecost

“Faithful” is the key word in Matthew 25:14-30. “Faithful” is the key word as we live trusting in God who united us with Christ’s death and resurrection in our baptism. He calls us to remain faithful to His truth, and we dare not “bury” any of it—such as truths about life and

marriage—simply because they are controversial. While avoiding such issues may bring praises from people, we desire to hear our God say, “Well done good and faithful servant” (Matthew 25:21a).

Prayer: Father, give us courage to be faithful to all aspects of Your truth. Amen.

November 23 – Last Sunday of the Church Year

How blessed we are to have a picture of the last day before that day comes! (Matthew 25:31-46) It reminds us sheep of our daily task—to serve Jesus by serving the vulnerable. It reminds the vulnerable of their grand purpose, they are Jesus to those who serve them.

Prayer: Jesus, help us be Your compassionate hands as we serve others in need. Help us be You as others serve us in our need. Amen.

November 30 – First Sunday in Advent

Two weeks ago Jesus reminded us of the importance of faithfulness. Today we hear of something even more important—“God is faithful, by whom you were called into the fellowship of his Son, Jesus Christ our Lord” (1 Corinthians 1:9). Thus He promises He “will sustain you to the end” (1:8a). Why is God so faithful to sinners? One huge reason: the value He gives to human life—“you are our potter; we are all the work of your hand” (Isaiah 64:8b).

Prayer: Father Potter, thank You for Your faithfulness and sustaining us to the end. Amen.
